complished ceramicist, and a skilled sculptor of metal. Nearly every gorgeous surface of the Cristál's home is a testament to how art truly lives in usually mundane scenarios (like



the most beautifully honed metal kitchen cabinets imaginable!).

Ed was born in Monterey Park, and spent his early years in North Hollywood. He attended

Grant High School and Chouinard Arts Institute in Los Angeles. After graduating, Ed worked as a model builder for an architectural firm and spent the next 20 years working and living in Mexico and Central California. In 1980, he met and married Marlene. He started a picture framing business in 1981, focusing mostly on commercial and entertainment industry work. This busi-

ness was very successful and allowed Ed to continue to travel and develop as an artist, investing in galleries and promoting his work. Ed and Marlene moved to Port Hueneme in 1998.

Channel Islands Maritime Museum, two large grey whales are captured artistically in metal, elevating themselves dramatically from the water mid-breach. They animate the facade of the Museum and give life to the building. Artist Ed Cristál designed and began building these sculptures in 2011, when the Maritime Museum was planning its move from Fisherman's Wharf across the harbor to the current location on Bluefin Circle.

Tragically, Ed suffered a stroke in 2012, putting an end to his active artistic career. The whales were finished physically by CIMM volunteer Todd Wiggins, a welder and materials engineer, who worked under Cristál's guidance



and with his original designs to complete the project.

Many artists pick a trade and focus on it, spending years perfecting their craft. Not Cristál. He was a master craftsman: a talented painter, an ac-

He worked tirelessly to promote his work, extending his knowledge and creativity with every project. He committed himself fully to every creative project in which he engaged.

Ed was an enthusiastic volunteer at CIMM, and he and his wife Marlene continue to benefit the Museum immensely. In addition to the whales, Ed's sundial leads the way to the Museum on the exterior west wall of the Yard Garden, and Marlene's tile designs brought to fruition the dragonfly on the surface of the Yard Garden and an abstract signal flag design around the perimeter wall. Ed logged in more than 1,200 hours as a docent at CIMM, and was named Volunteer of the Year in 2011.

Ed's life was his art, and in turn his art reflects so much about him and his life. The Museum was honored to exhibit his work and shine a spotlight on this artist who continues to inspire us all.

Southern California's First Mariners

rom the Mexican border northward, people who reside by the Pacific Ocean have been using the ocean waters for food, recreation, and transportation for many centuries. From the Mexican border to the north, some of the earliest human shoreline inhabitants faced various survival issues. These early California residents developed their own methods of dealing with the ocean long before the Europeans and people from other parts of planet Earth arrived on the scene.

Our first group of Southern California Maritimers were the Dieguenos who inhabited the coastal areas of what is now San Diego County. They included the Tipai and Ipay bands. Historians place them in the Hokan language group. They greeted Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo on his famous northern-bound gold seeking trip. But even though they were coastal residents, they tended to rely mostly on hunting and gathering inland for their food supply. going watercraft.

North of the Dieguenos were the Luiseno Native Americans. They populated the areas north of San Diego County between Oceanside and Newport Beach. While the Luiseno people also were not known for their maritime exploits, they did fish the local waters between Oceanside and Newport Beach in dugout canoes. The canoes were usually made from Douglas fir or white pine. Many Luiseno fishermen believed that when you caught a fish you should not eat it yourself but give it to someone else! Continuing up the California coast were the Gabrielinos. They resided in the coastal regions of Orange and Los Angeles Counties. Gabrielinos were members of the Shoshonean language group (the largest language group in the southwest.) In addition to their coastal residences some also made their homes on Santa Catalina and San Clemente Islands. Anthropologist Alfred Kroeber estimated the population of the Gabrielinos to be about 5,000 in 1770.

Perhaps the most famous Native American group in Southern California was the Chumash. Their coastal encampments extended from Malibu clear up to San Luis Obispo, and they inhabited four of the Channel Islands (Anacapa, San Miguel. Santa Cruz and Santa Rosa). In the Chumash language the names for these islands are: Anyapakh, Tuquan, Limuw and Wi'ma. These Chumash names all had a connection with the ocean.

The Chumash also had a large inland location along the Santa Clara River. Interestingly, the town of Saticoy was the largest Chumash encampment.

Fortunately for the CIMM we have a Chumash display. Consequently, docents and visitors can learn more about these fascinating Southern California mariners at CIMM, and we look forward to the installation of a new Chumash tomol display soon on the Upper Deck. Currently, Chumash tomols and tiats are available for all to see. Tomols were made from redwood when it was available. Redwood logs floated down the coast from the northern redwood forests.

Early native mariners were indeed an integral part of our Channel Islands Maritime Legacy.

A Museum

thrives when funds are available to maintain the elevator monthly, buy office supplies; pay staff to administrate, market, and curate; maintain and update the galleries; buy new equipment when needed; fabricate



and design new exhibits; pay for insurance, electric, gas, security, trash, rent, water, and telephone bills; purchase ads, design and print marketing materials, wash the windows, build model cases; website and social media work; buy chairs, host and produce events, be members of national museum organizations, pay the gardener and cleaning crew; create appealing programs to educate and attract visitors; clean the carpets; maintain heating and air conditioning; rent storage, lease a copier/printer, hire a bookkeeper and grant writer, and ultimately put money away for an endowment to insure this wonderful museum continues long after we are gone. Minimally, this adds up to \$20,000 per month.

CIMM puts on an astounding show every day of the year, and we are thankful for the generous support that we receive. Money is raised by gifts and grants, admissions, memberships, museum store sales, fundraising, programs and events. My inquisitive docent will be paying the elevator bill monthly now that he realizes the need, and I am very grateful.
